

The Evolution of a Cup



 A piece of fine china has its inception at the drawing board. The aim is to create a design and shape in keeping with the fineness of the body. For lasting pleasure, designs are based on familiar motifs.



 Raw materials are thoroughly roixed with water; in the "pugging" operation (above), rolls of moist clay are formed with excess water removed. Raw clays used are the world's whiteest, from various southern states, also Pennsylvania and Maine.



3. Potter's wheel, symbol of an ageold craft, is still used in an industry which remains predominately handoperated. In rapid succession, skilled potter's hands form basic cup shapes from balls of clay cut from a roll.



4. Basic shape is turned into exact cup form by pressing it in revolving mold. This step is called "liningpressing." Careful hands and watchful eyes throughout the entire operation assure china's beauty and durability.



 Cup handles are made in an independent operation, by pouring liquid clay into molds; each plaster-of-Paris mold forming twelve handles. Handles are assured exactly the same consistency and strength as the body of the cup.



 After clay dries properly, molds are opened and handles removed. They are then "fettled" or handtrimmed to remove seams formed by the mold. Handles are inished to a fine smoothness and cut to fit exactly when joined to cup.



7. Cup "handling" operation attaches handle to cup. The liquid clay body in shallow vessel is the binder. Open end of handle is dipped in solution, then pressed by hand. Any excess liquid clay is carefully sponged away.



 Completely formed cups are then ready for first firing in the kiln. To preserve their shape while being fired, two cups are "boxed" by attaching lips with a light binding solution; cups are separated later.



 Clay is in the kiln from 70-90 hours. Starting at a temperature of 300° F., cars are moved mechanically through temperatures which gradually reach a peak of 2300° F. (higher than temperature of molten iron); then heat gradually drops.



10. Glazing contributes not only the lustrous appearance of fine china but also its wearing surface. Cups are quickly dipped in a tub of glaze, essentially a liquid refractory glass. After 36 hours in the glost kiln, the lustre is revealed.



11. Next comes decoration of the cup. Decalcomañias, engraved in long strips according to the exact design, are attached along a sketched line put on the cup as a guide. With careful pressure, the decalcomania is rubbed flat on the surface with a wet sponge.



12. Painting lines on the cup is a delicate operation. Cup is attached to a small turntable which arrist rotates with left hand; with right hand he paints on the platinum line. Joining line is a difficult maneuver.

fuse to form a completely non-porous acid-resistant product. It is durable enough to use every day (pretty enough, too!), and difficult to break.

The beauty of fine china is more than skin-deep. Prove this to yourself by holding a plate up to the light. See the silhouette of your hand behind it. Fine china only looks delicate, but is really more durable than a thicker plate which does not have the highly desirable translucent quality. Also, if you balance a plate lightly on your fingertips and strike it sharply with a pencil, the resulting "ring" is clear and bell-like (in pottery and earthenware, it's dull). Two ways, then, to tell fine china: translucence and a clear high tone.



13. In form and pattern, the finished cup is the end product of exhaustive consumer testing and infinite study to attain a design as functional in use as it is pleasing in appearance. In body, the cup represents a century of industrious crafting to make American china among the finest in the world.

Care of fine china

Fine china is durable, and takes a great deal of hard usage. But, like anything that is beautiful, it deserves reasonable care. Washing is as simple as this: hand-wash with a packaged detergent, rinse clean with hot water, drain dry or wipe with a soft linen towel. You don't need to worry about washing it in a dishwasher either, since most dishwashers have rubber—or plastic-coated racks. Use one of the effective but harmless detergents, such as Cascade.

Easy Do's and Simple Don'ts

Do rinse china, before you wash it; a soft brush, rubber wiper or a spray does beautifully.

Coffee shouldn't be allowed to dry in cups, because that makes it harder to clean them.

Do drop plates and saucers gently into place, rather than slide them. Gem-hard china can scratch itself!

Do stack plates with little separating pads, if you have them.

Do store cups on hooks, instead of stacking.

Do warm your plates before use, if you wish to. Fine china is heat-resistant, takes to warming happily.

Don't scour your lovely china with scouring pads or powder. Don't rub aluminum or silver against the hard glaze; it often leaves metal marks that are hard to get off.
